Hazards

- Pipe exposure
- Infrastructure floating
- Decks, sheds move
- Fences down



Company considerations

- Emergency locates
- Increased staffing
- Depth of cover impacted?
- Increase ground & aerial patrols
- Signs down



What activities should be expected

- Increased media presence
- Increased vehicle crossings
- Increased ground disturbance activities
 - Recontouring, laser levelling
 - New drainage swales
 - dig/clear drainage ditches
 - Replacing fences
 - Replace irrigation systems



- Bury or remove animal carcasses
- Replace topsoil
- Change of crops to riskier ones
- Debris piles on ROW (construction of facility)
- Landowners hire new contractors

Extraordinary circumstances may call for extra measures

Increase your media presence

- regular media if you can get it
- social media for sure

More public awareness activities:

- Face to face
- Knock & drop awareness packages

Contact Agricultural Associations to put the word out to their members





After the disaster

Extraordinary circumstances may call for extra measures



- EOCs – work with agencies & commodity groups
- Key Messages to landowners (CBYD messaging)

- Contact local, provincial & federal agriculture associations to get word to members
- Work with Flood Recovery groups that remove debris
- Links on Agency sites to your Co. & vv.

Understand finance/grant process – indicator when landowner may start work
